Professor Sir Michael Marmot MBBS, MPH, PhD, FRCP, FFPHM, FMedSci, FBA, Professor of Epidemiology, UCL, Director of UCL Institute of Health Equity, @MichaelMarmot

- 'We need to create the conditions for communities to take control of their lives - this is vital!'
- 'The one thing I can recommend: build back fairer.'
- 'Being hopeful means don't ask me if things will get better, let's do what we can to make it more likely that things will get better. I'm hopeful and that hope will be moderated by reality but there is certainly a lot of good will around.'
- 'Nurses are highly trusted in society. Advocacy is important, nurses have earned the trust of the general population. Speak up on behalf of the population you serve.'



2. 'Why is Covid Killing People of Colour?'

David Harewood MBE, Actor, Director, Author and Activist

- '14% of NHS workforce are black and mixed ethnicity yet they made up 95% of the deaths of those working in the NHS.'
- 'People don't want to hear that racism plays a role in any of these things. That denialism and shutting me down is very stressful so I can understand that people working saying they didn't feel safe, don't want to stand out or speak up.'
- 'The more we can to create a safe space, where discussions can take place where people feel enabled and empowered to speak their truth and mind, the better.'
- For centuries a certain way of thinking has taken hold, it'll take a lot of work for people to unlearn that and become true allies in the fight, because it's in the boardrooms, in the dressing rooms. The wider conversation has to happen in wider societies.'

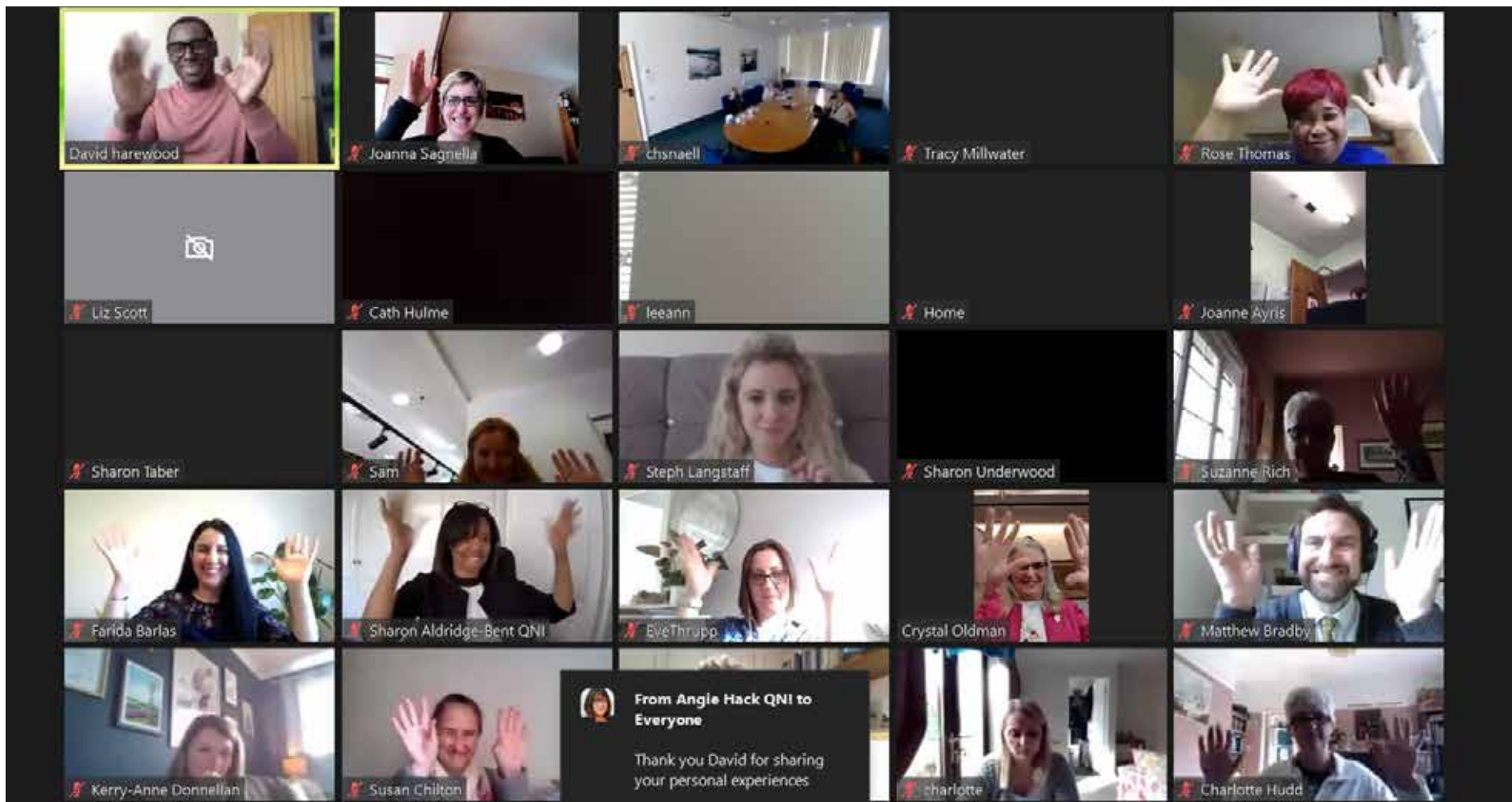


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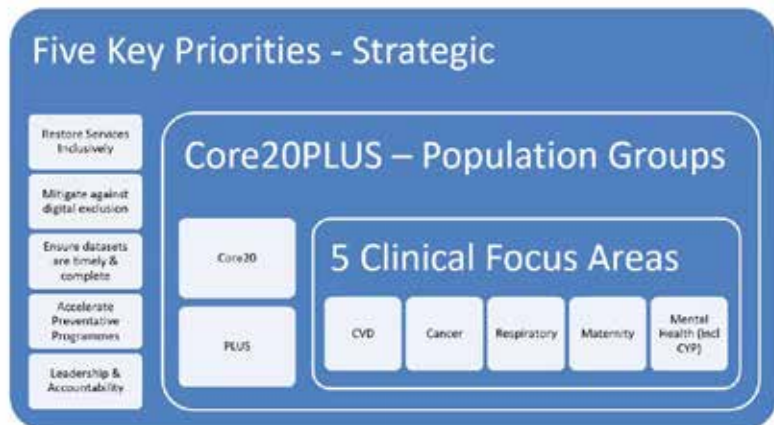

- Multi disciplinary community care: GP clusters in Wales



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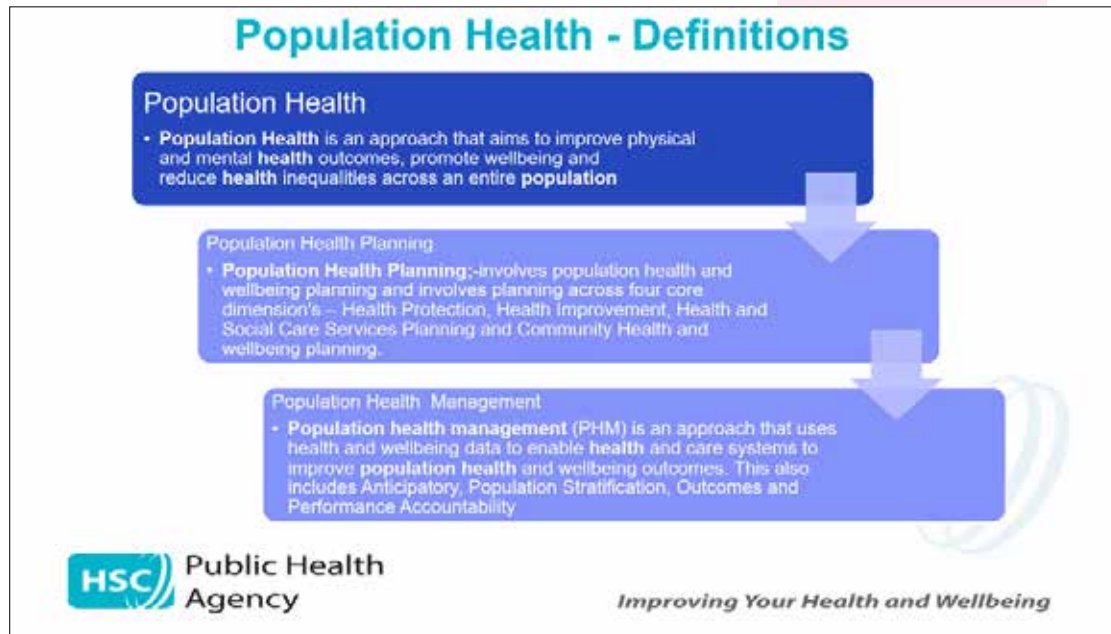
